of college students surveyed described their health as very good or excellent.

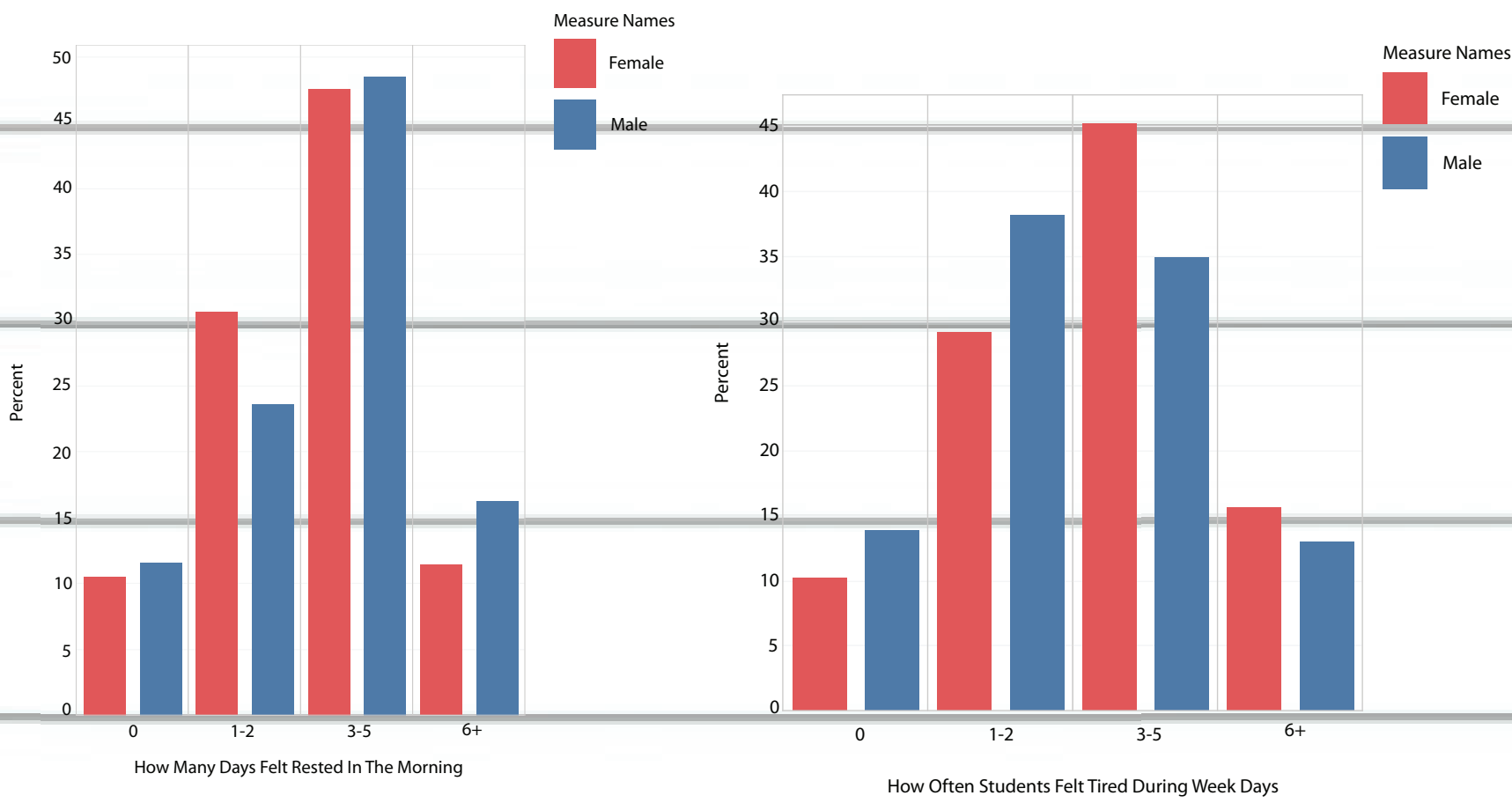
80.6 %

of sexually active college students reported using (or reported their partner used) emergency contraception within the last 12 months.

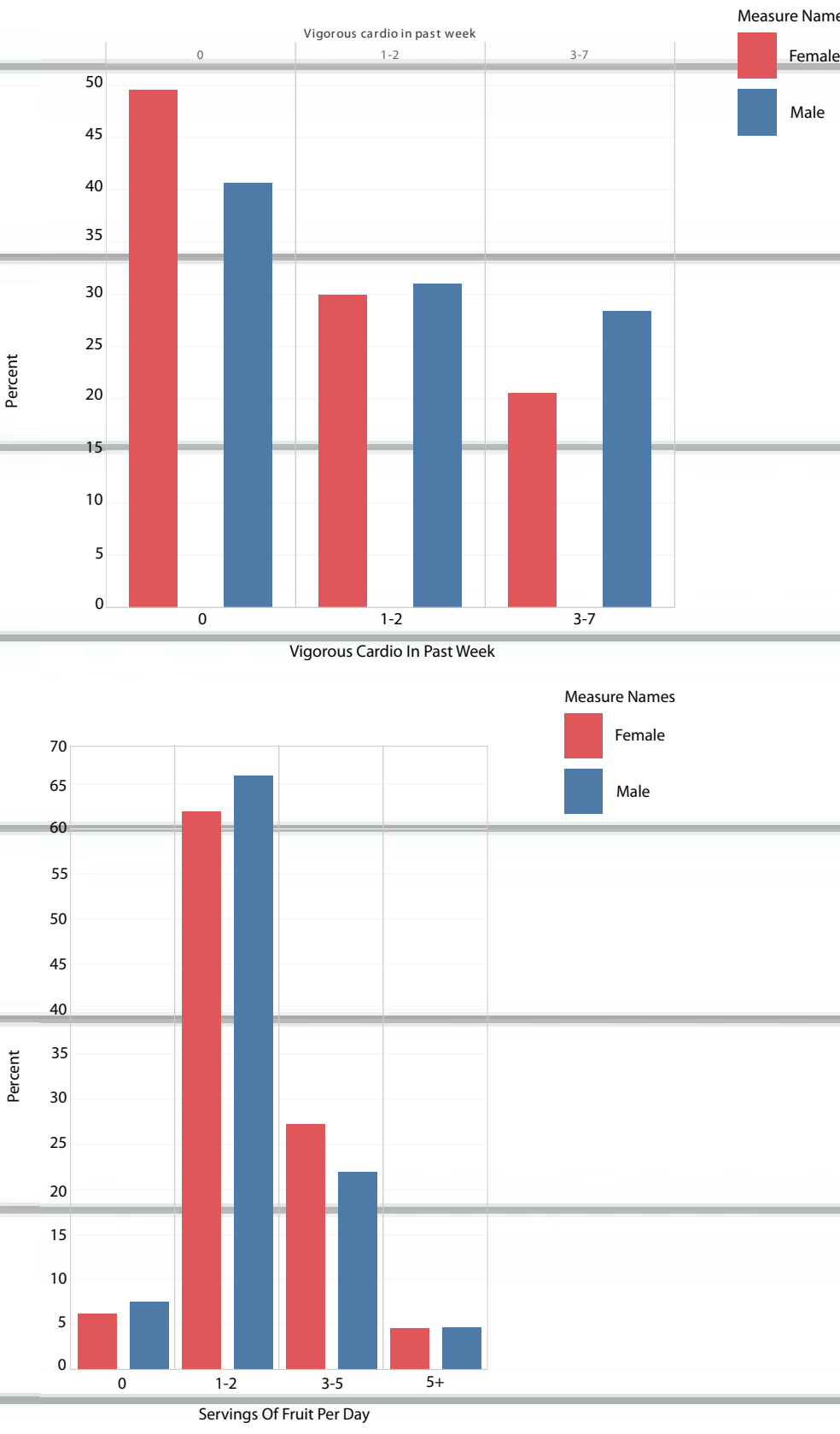
1.2 %

This poster uses data provided by the San Francisco State University Health Center, based upon a survey filled out by the student body in 2016. The survey focuses heavily on the difference between student perception of other students and the truth about other students. Usually the difference between the perceived percentage of things and the actual percentage was so drastically different. 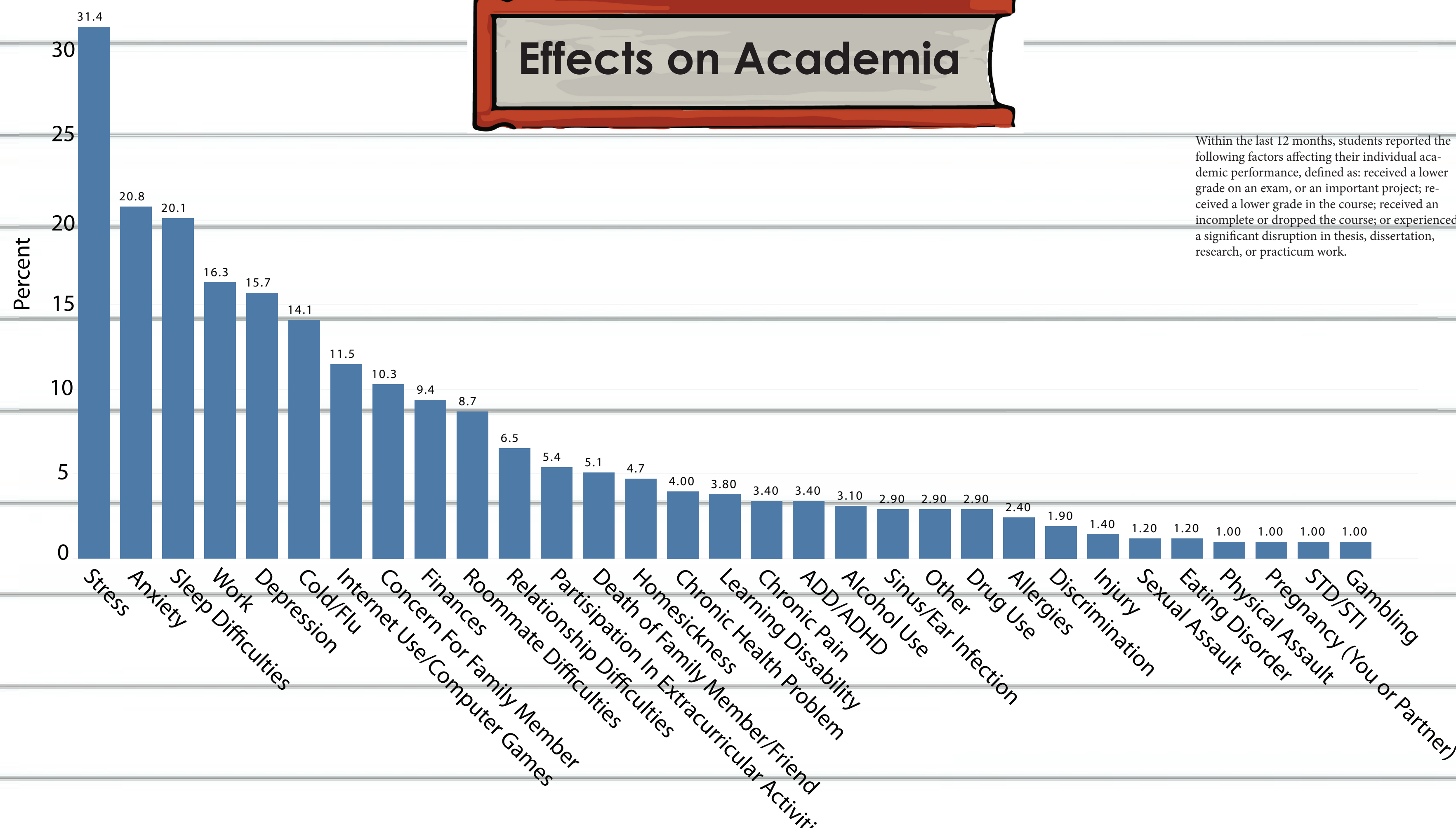
Sleep Habits



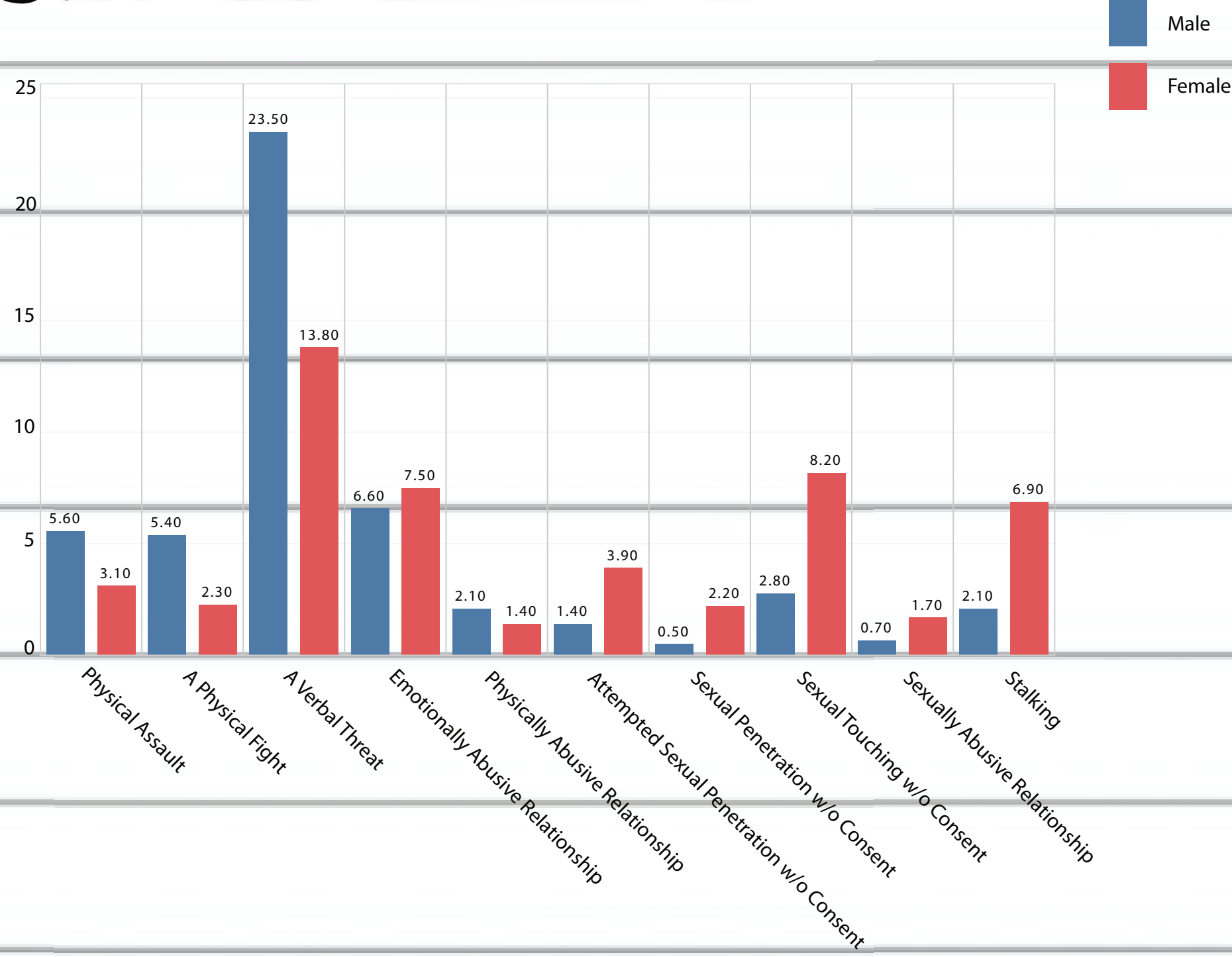

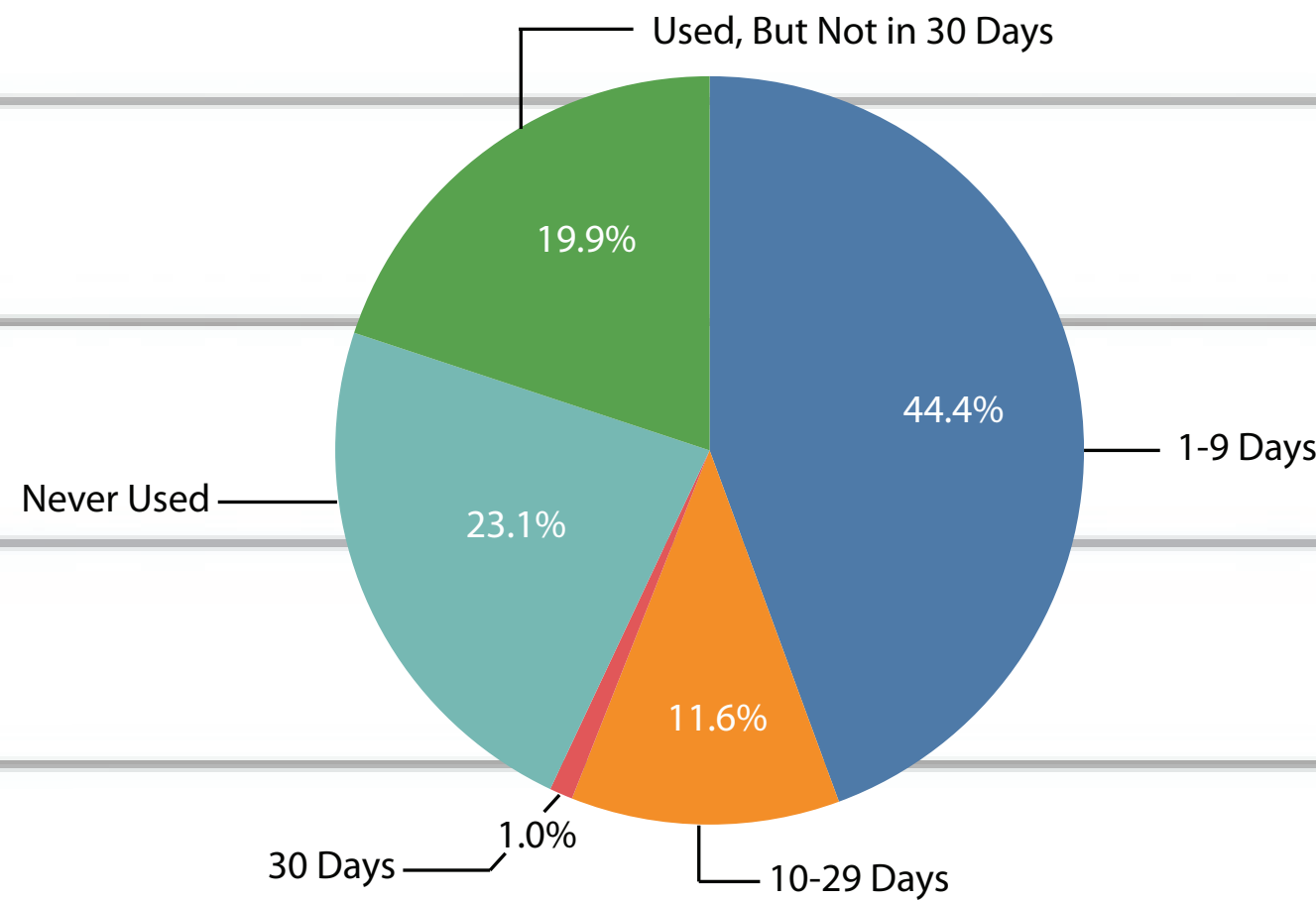

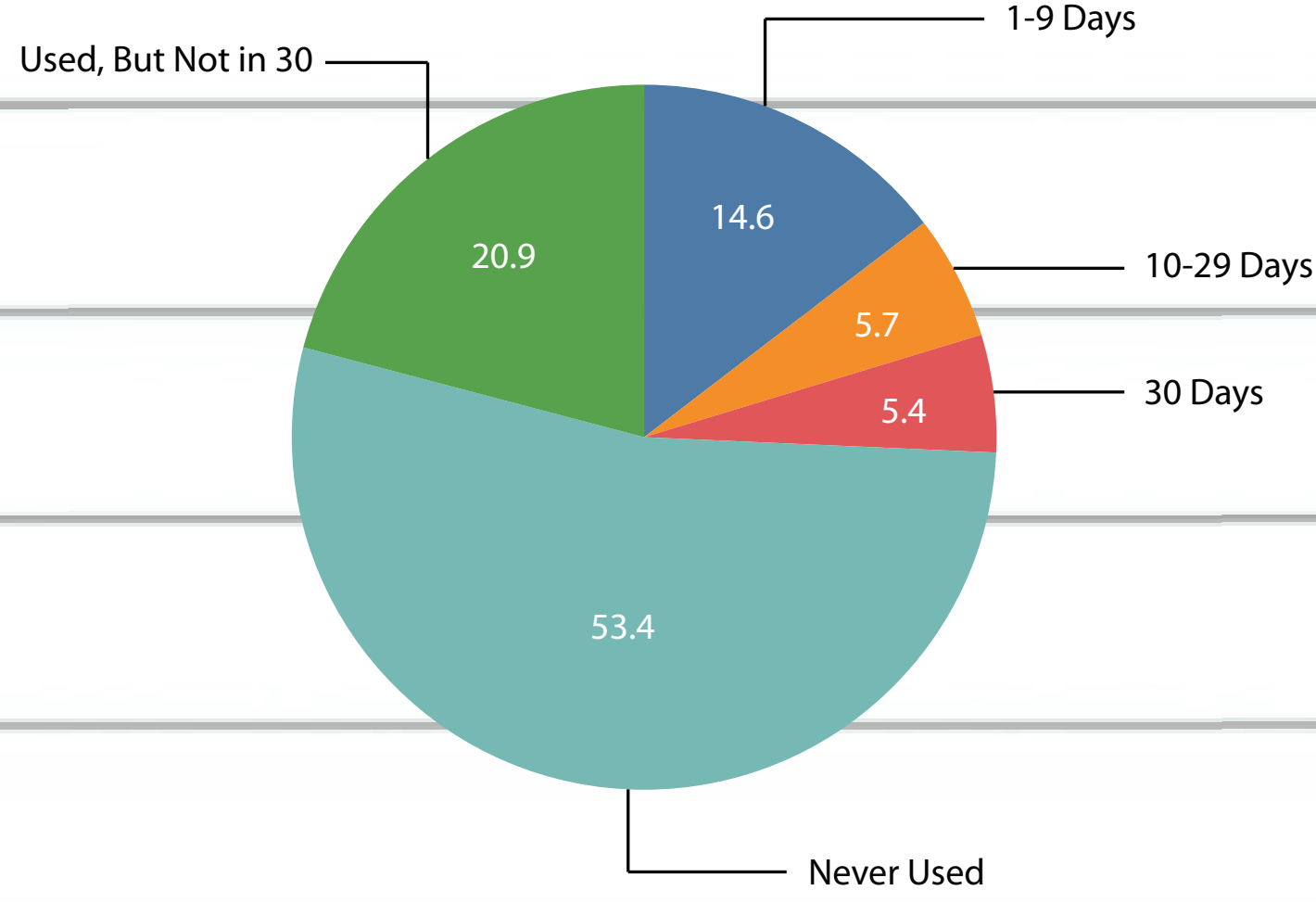


Substance Consumption
