The San Francisco Rent Crisis


San Francisco, one of the most densely populated cities in the US (second only to New York), has a population of more than 870,000 within a 47 square mile area and constantly rising. And the rent has risen along with it jumping from a median of roughly \$2900 in 2012 to \$4000 in 2017.

The reasons vary, but among them are the startup boom of the early 2010s which saw many young professionals relocating to the city, driving up demand. Another is restrictive zoning laws which have kept the local character of the city at the expense of denser housing units. Whatever the causes, SF has an increasing lead among the highest median rents in the country with no sign of slowing down.


