Course structure: Analysis of given texts and design (or re-design) of appropriate formats and layouts for their effective display.

Emphasis on the combination of technological and linguistic aspects of the given text. This will include the ability to determine the length of a manuscript by using various type specifications, the critical visual interpretation of the various elements of the text: these may be called its body copy, title, caption, etc.

Assignment descriptions will be introduced at various points during the course. There will be four main projects which will last approximately three weeks each.

If extra time is available, there will be in-class presentations and exercises/workshops on various topics of interest: concrete books, bookbinding, artist books, etc.

Project 1: What is design? by Charles Eames

Analyze the given text and note its primary elements and function.

Develop a format, select a typeface and design an appropriate layout which will include the text as well as the photograph, the diagram and the flower arrangement.

Note: On all projects the description of the assignment will be kept to a minimum. Format will generally be open but subject to approval by the instructor. Overall, the student will be asked to establish her/his own constraints in the development of the project.

Paper work will be kept to a minimum. Everyone will be responsible for keeping up with schedules, critiques, deadlines, as these will be announced only once.

Attendance is a must since materials taught in this class will be delivered mostly "live" and not through handouts or xeroxes.

Additional assignments, tests, and/or presentations will be announced with sufficient notice.

Project # 4

Inspired Typography

Booklet: seven spreads + front & back cover
Binding: any, except gbc and vello (subject to approval)
Maximum page size: 7x9½, vertical or horizontal
Final piece must be in xerox/stat/printed form (no paste-up)

Due: December 12, 1990 (two copies).

Each spread must have typographic examples from the history of typography that relate to the text.

Each spread must illustrate one of the following relations of contrast:

structure
texture
form
direction
rhythm
weight
size

Even though the contrasts are being demonstrated, the booklet must have a harmonious, well-defined structure.
Remember: form <---> content

The text must include captions for your samples and a colophon. The latter could be part of the cover or of a wraparound jacket.
